The National Counterintelligence and Security Center (NCSC) is part of the Office of the Director of National Intelligence. NCSC was initially established as the National Counterintelligence Executive (NCIX) on December 28, 2000 when President Bill Clinton signed Presidential Decision Directive (PDD) 75 "Counterintelligence Effectiveness: Counterintelligence for the 21st Century." The Counterintelligence Enhancement Act of 2002 (signed by President George W. Bush) gave this entity a statutory basis. NCIX was transition to NCSC by the Director of National Intelligence in December 2014. NCSC missions include:

- National Threat Identification and Prioritization Assessment (NTIPA) and other analytic (counterintellgence) CI products.
- The National Counterintelligence Strategy of the United States of America.
- Priorities for Cl collection, investigations, and operations.,
- CI program budgets and evaluations that reflect strategic priorities.
- In-depth espionage damage assessments.
- CI awareness, outreach, and training standards policies.

NCSC works with industry to protect the security of national security sensitive information and products. Sample information resources on its website include <u>Guidelines for Personnel Security Research Recommendations</u> <u>from the IC Behavioral and Social Sciences Research Group</u> (2012), *Traveling Overseas With Mobile Phones, Laptops, PDAs, and Other Electronic Devices* (n.d.), instructional video tutorials, older editions of reports such as the National Counterintelligence Strategy of the United States, reports on economic espionage against the United States from 1995-2011, Summary of Federal Citations for the National Insider Threat Task Force (n.d.), and Protect Your Organization from the Inside Out: Government Best Practices (2016). Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank-The Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AAIB) began as a Chinese initiative in 2013.

It serves as a multilateral development bank focusing on developing Asian infrastructure sectors such as energy and power, transportation and telecommunications, agriculture and rural infrastructures, water supply and sanitation, environmental protection, urban development, and logistics.
